

The actual time taken was nearer an hour, but very interesting and well worthwhile.

Having once again boarded our transport we made for Hastings. Owing to misdirections we toured the town for some twenty minutes before finding our quarry - and the Castle was little more than one on a mound which soon provided the necessary terrain for games of attackers and defenders! A tour of the St.Clements Caves was then followed by a very welcome tea finishing after six o'clock.

and we again phoned to say we were running late.


