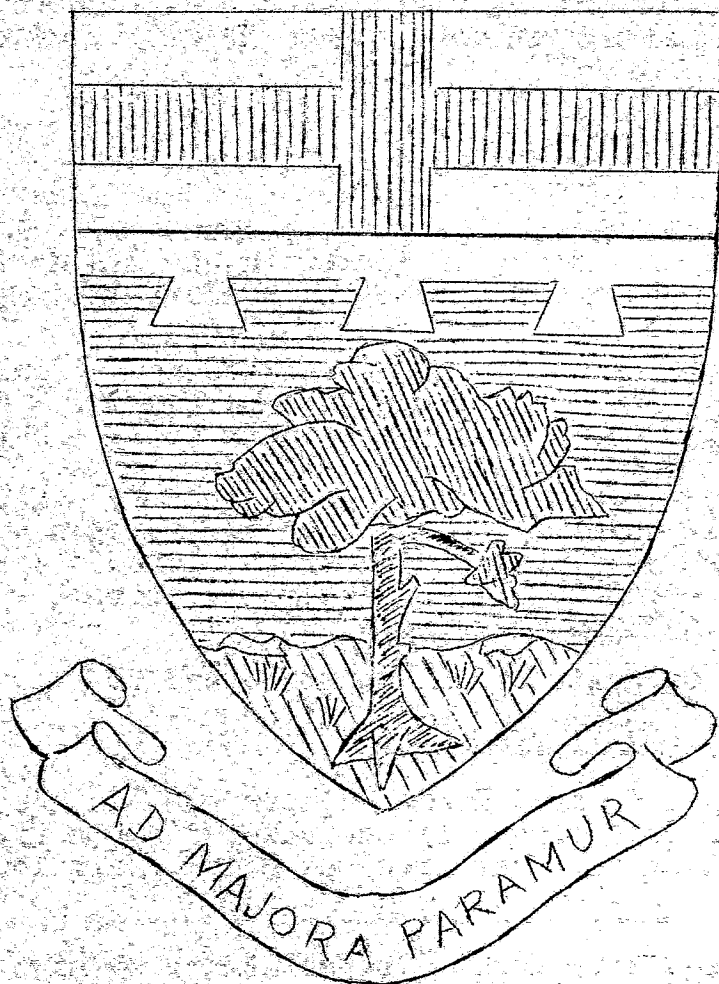

As the years pass so it becomes increasingly difficult to make this outing an historical affair. It is often historic and memorable but not in the way intended by the organisers; each year produces the unexpected and unforeseen. This year it was decided that we should visit Bodiam Castle, Battle Abbey, Hastings Castle and the St. Clements Caves. "Phew", said one boy, "eighty five miles to Hastings for a start!"

Fifty six boys together with Fathers Francis and Aidan and Mr. Bushell were scheduled to leave at 9 a.m! We left at 9.20!! We had decided to make a brief stop on the way at the shrine of Our Lady of Consolation at West Grinstead. Did I say brief? We had not reckoned with a Parish Priest who very much knew his drill, and we had to go through it... 50 minutes!! It was also the first stop for money spending: souvenirs and soft drinks dispensed by a lady from the Emerald Isle: "They're five pence each dear, but I've no change, so I'll let you have them for sixpence!!"

We eventually arrived at Bodiam after 1 p.m. when lunch was evidently the first order of the day. After lunch we had a look at the Castle which was in a really delightful setting though little remained except the outside walls.

Then on to Battle Abbey. We baled out, discovered that the guided tour would take forty minutes and so sallied forth with a guide who was gifted with an excellent knowledge of his subject and a subtle and appreciated sense of humour. The actual time taken was nearer an hour, but very interesting and well worthwhile.

Having once again boarded our transport we made for Hastings. Owing to misdirections we toured the town for some twenty minutes before finding our quarry - and the Castle was little more than one on a mound which soon provided the necessary terrain for games of attackers and defenders! A tour of the St. Clements Caves was then followed by a very welcome tea finishing after six o'clock.

Our drivers then decided that the shortest way home was via the coast road!!!!!! To our utter amazement and consternation we were taken through St. Leonards,

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Bexhill, Pevensey, Eastbourne (here at 7.30 p.m. we decided to warn the Headmaster that we might be a little late!!), Seaford, Newhaven (but not via Dieppe, although we might well have expected it by now), on through Peacehaven, Brighton, Hove, Portslade and Shoreham. We were all now genuinely amazed when we suddenly swung inland instead of going on to Portsmouth. At Washington more petrol was needed and we again phoned to say we were running late.

The two drivers now had different ideas as to the quickest way home and each went his own way, the Third Form arriving home at 10.5 p.m. and the Fourth Form some ten minutes later.

We were welcomed by a very tolerant and sympathetic Headmaster who granted the school half an hour extra in bed next morning.

A tiring but truly memorable and historic day!

### STUMPS

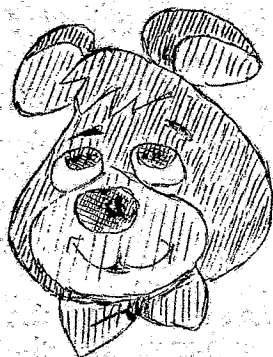

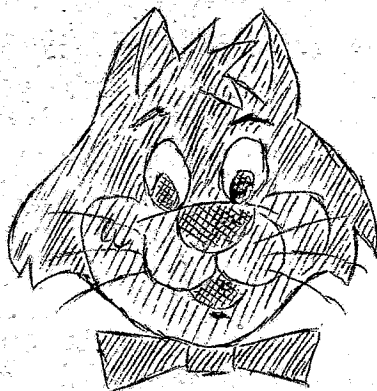

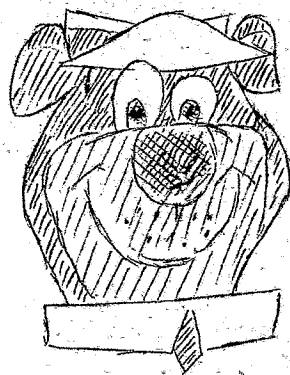
