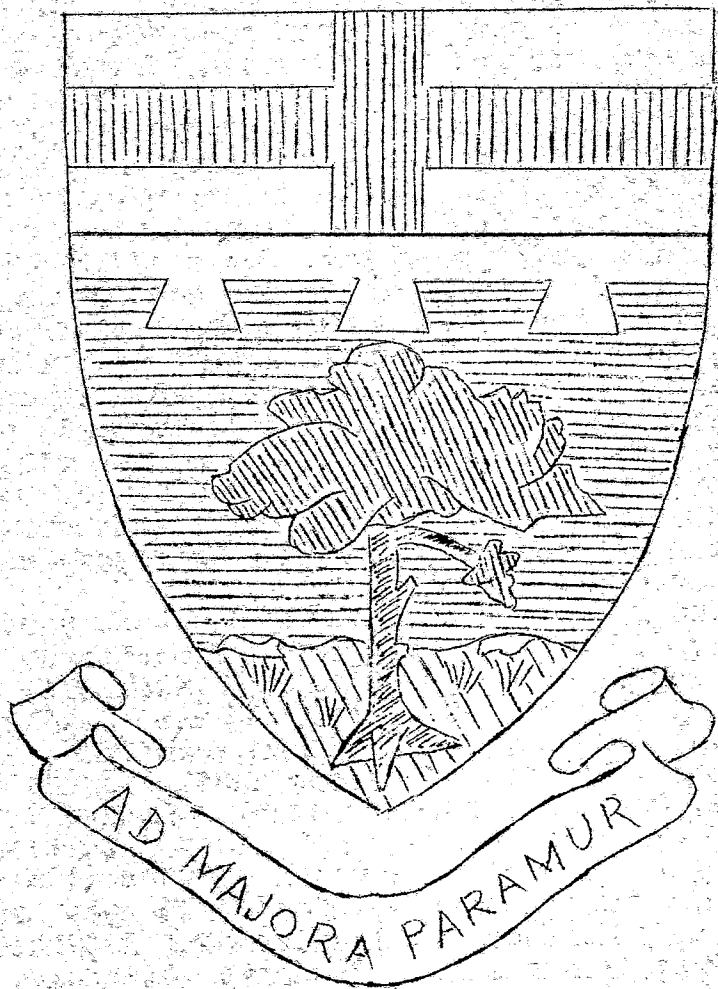

1. THE ALDERSHOT MUSIC FESTIVAL.... Sat. May 12th 1962

This year we entered three choirs comprising a total of sixty six boys drawn from all Forms in the school.

In the Under 10 age group twenty two boys from Forms I and II sang a unison song "The Cupboard" by Eric Leigh, and a two-part canon "I have twelve oxen" by Eric Thiman.

The 10 to 12 age group had two unison songs to sing, "The Lamb" by Earnest Bullock and "The Jolly Carter" by E.J. Moeran. Twenty seven boys from Forms II, III and IV sang in this section.

Twenty eight boys from Forms III and IV were in the 11 to 15 age group, the two songs being "Whither" by Schubert and "Star Candles" by Michael Head; the second containing a certain amount of two and three part singing which the boys managed very well indeed.

The adjudicator was Mr. John Russell, a professor of the Royal College of Music, who was pleased with the boys' tone but was critical of their words.

However, three Merit Certificates were gained, one being a 'second', and all had a very enjoyable and instructive morning.

OTHER FAREWELLS

At the end of this Journal is published a list of the boys who are leaving us at the end of this term. Unfortunately we are also losing two members of the staff.

Miss S. Newman has been on the teaching staff as Form Mistress of Form Two for five and a half years during which time a large number of small boys has passed through her very capable hands. To her has fallen the task, not only of consolidating the groundwork done in Form One, but also of developing it and directing the studies towards the Eleven Plus Examination. The ever increasing number of passes is some indication of the very excellent work she has done.

Besides this everyday very important but often unrecognised grind Miss Newman has never spared herself in the production of the Lower School Play each year. During her sojourn here she has produced or helped to produce five plays - every one a great success.

Her really hard work in this line did not end there. Fathers Francis and Aidan will ever be very grateful to her for annually assisting them in their Upper School productions by helping with the costumes and make-up. In such pantomimical productions her work has been the sine qua non of the success which they have hitherto had.

Each year too she has acted as one of the judges in the Reading Competition.

Many a time also she has been seen on the playing fields helping with Hockey and Football games, and each year she has assiduously and competently acted as a Judge on Sports Day.

In times of illness she has always been the first to come forward and offer to take extra classes and supervisions. We are indeed sorry to lose such a very generous and willing member of the staff who is liked, admired and a friend to all.

She is now off to take up a teaching post in Spain and our very best wishes go with her for every success and happiness.

The other member of the staff to leave us this term is Miss C.A. Lafferty who has been school Matron for three and a half years. This work stretches far beyond the daily attention given to small boys' many minor ailments. To this daily dispensary routine must be added that of organising and attending to the evening baths and cleanliness of the children. All this has been carried out with an ideal efficiency enhanced by a warm understanding of the solace and consolation needed by small boys in their occasional moments of homesickness. But she also had the insight needed to be able to discover the genuine cases!

When the boys were really unwell and in times of epidemics she never spared herself. And when members of the staff were unwell she even took over supervisions and also classes!!

Added to all this was the supervision of the school linen room. The thankless task of unpacking and checking at the beginning of terms. The routine checking of laundry each week and finally the tiring and backbreaking work of checking and packing the trunks at the end of each term when small boys present vast quantities of accumulated treasures to be put into already overtaxed and near to bursting trunks and cases. And at the last, as also at half-terms, the frantic rush to get overnight cases packed in time for the final departure.

She certainly could and did put her "skates" on (and ice ones at that) at these times and we knew the work would be done in time.

Then would come the week-ends of the School Plays when hers was the task not only of dispensing the liquid refreshment on the evening itself but also of preparing it all. The hours of "behind the scenes" preparatory work done by her is known only to the staff who will ever be grateful for all her help on these occasions.

She was always interested in all the children did and was very frequently seen on the touch line at rugger matches, nomatter what the weather, shouting words of encouragement; or sitting quietly in the sun watching cricket matches.

Above all her confidence and a very happy nature made us all realise that we could rely on her help at all times.

Miss Lafferty is going to the United States where she has a post in a large Washington, D.C. hospital. May she continue there, as she has here, to bring happiness to all around her and we wish her every happiness in her new work.

The coach at last arrived and we started our journey with cheers and shouts of joy as we made our way down the drive and out of the school gates; we were at last on our way to Hampton Court. Caps and blazers off! We sat back to relax and enjoy the freedom that was ours for the whole day. The coach in front was kept under close observation through field glasses for they must not arrive one second before us.

One stop only, and that for our fifty or more passengers to have a bottle of milk. Bottles emptied, we climbed aboard and the coach moved on once more.

On arrival, in brilliant sunshine, the boys hastily started buying postcards of various views of the Court; only to be rounded up by Fr. Aidan and driven through the wrought iron gates to be photographed by Fr. Bede.

We then approached the Moat, which to our bitter disappointment was empty! We filed into the Clock Court where the brightly coloured clock must have held a special fascination as it was some time before we moved on over the cobbles and into the Palace itself.

The tickets checked, we sounded our way up the King's staircase. The walls and ceiling presented magnificent paintings of Gods, Goddesses and Heroes of Ancient Rome. Next came the King's Guard Room where guns and knives of all shapes and sizes hung safely out of reach in the most intriguing patterns. On and on and through the great Hall where hung the most exquisite paintings.

Down in the Kitchen we were rather surprised to see the keen interest shown in the 'olde worlde' kitchen utensils. Who told these boys that the quickest way to a man's heart is through his stomach?

We left the Palace to see the carpets of flowers adorning the gardens, the innumerable shrubs of various colours swaying gracefully in the gentle breeze.

Time was moving fast! We just had to find, and eventually get lost in, the marvellous Maze. In the course of our search we rested for a while in the heat of the mid-day sun each with a very welcome icecream.
